

Refocus on Mission



ovid-19 has been the great disrupter!
Everything came to a standstill, as humanity faced the onslaught of this invisible enemy. Hundreds of thousands of lives have been tragically lost, millions more have contracted the virus and

suffered the devastating effects of this contagion. Economies have been turned upside down and will take years, if not decades, to recover fully from the shutdown brought on by the advance of the virus. Life will never be the same again - including our church life! There will be a new normal when it comes to church life. We have become used to just going downstairs in "regular clothing" to attend the services on Zoom. For some church has become an opportunity to lay in bed and just listen to the services as they dose in and out of slumber. For others it is an opportunity to multi-task as they prepare a meal or wash some dishes as the service is going on – they are muted and the camera is turned off so no one will see what they are up too. There are many who have discovered a smorgasbord of church services that they can attend right after checking in with the "home" church to see what they are up too. Yes, life will never be the same! But the mission stays the same. I would like you to turn in your Bibles to Philippians 1:27-30 and read it several times just so you can ingest the flavor of what the Apostle Paul is trying to communicate in these verses. Simply, we have a mission given to us by our Commander-in-Chief, to take the message of His salvation and Lordship into enemy territory, to win captives from the forces of darkness. And even during this pandemic we cannot forget or give up on the mission. As in every war, our mission requires combat and struggle. Intense circumstances call for an intense faith, and if we stay focused on the mission, work hand in hand with each other, and lean upon the Almighty arms of our Commander-in-chief, Jesus Christ, we shall be victorious. Remember, it is for the sake of Christ, who someday soon will burst forth in the clouds of glory and will triumph over all His enemies and reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords. And if we all endure to the end; we will also reign with Him. STAY FOCUSED ON THE MISSION.

Tell me about yourself?



am the fourth of six children. I was born in St. Mary,
Jamaica. Unfortunately, in 1970 our father tragically died in a car accident. My mother accepted the challenge as a single parent in an exemplary way.

Upon our arrival in Canada, my siblings and I attended Oakwood Collegiate Institute. I went to both Oakwood University and the University of Toronto. I transferred to U of T as a result of an accident I was involved in on a return trip to school.

On a snowy, ice-covered highway in Ohio, the van we were travelling in overturned. By the grace of God, the lives of all of us in the van were spared. As a result of this accident, my mother met a parent of one of the students who was in the accident. The faith of this parent inspired my mother to want to know Christ for herself. She eventually accepted the Lord as her personal Saviour.

In 1982, I married Frankie Lazarus whom I met at the Toronto East Seventh-day Adventists Church. We have two adult children, Lamarr and Lachelle.

My service here at Mt. Olive has been delightful and I look forward to the worship and fellowship each week.

How did you become a Seventh-day Adventist?

At the tender age of 5, a neighbour asked our parents for permission to take my siblings and I to church on Saturdays. I enjoyed going each week. Looking back, I think I enjoyed the lunch they provided each Sabbath more than anything else...fried dumplings, callaloo with salt fish and red Kool-Aid drink.

After we moved away from the neighbourhood, I pleaded with my parents to find someone else who would take me to the same church which they did. After observing my interest in attending church, my parents were inspired to make the sacrifice and enrolled me in an Adventist school. At the age of 12, I was baptized at the Washington Gardens Seventh-day Adventist church.

I thank the Lord for His working in my life for inspiring my parents to be a part of fulfilling His plan for my life. I pray that I will always look for any opportunity to help someone experience the joy of knowing my Lord and Saviour.

How has Christianity Influenced your Life?

I know the joy and peace that I experience even during the difficult times in my life are attributed only to being a follower of Christ. The many promises found in the Bible make it possible to get through those difficult times. For example, Mark 10:27 states "And Jesus looking upon them saith, With men it is impossible, but not with God, for with God all things are possible."

My Christianity influences my life because I do not feel the need to get enjoyment or pleasure by seeking after worldly things. I am contented and grateful for what the Lord has provided and is providing for me.

I am very happy in the Lord, living a life of caring for all aspects of my life-mental, spiritual, physical and social.

Tell me a time when you experience God's miraculous power?

Throughout my life, I have felt God's miraculous power. I have been an undeserving recipient of God's grace and mercy more times than I can count. I have been spared from near collisions on the roadways. He has provided help numerous times and at just the right time – His time. He has also shown grace and mercy every day for the things I take for granted like waking me up every morning, providing me with food, shelter, a loving family, and the list could go on and on.

God's miracle working power was evident in sparing the life of my nephew after he experienced a horrific accident. This has made a lasting impact on my family and friends. After performing what was considered a lifesaving surgery, the surgeon met with the family and stated that she had done the best she could but not sure it that was enough to keep him alive. Another doctor indicated that if he should survive, he would be in a "vegetative state"- unable to communicate, see, eat on his own and would be unaware of anything or anyone. We even had a meeting with the social worker who suggested donating his organs.

Throughout all these dire predictions, we felt the presence of God. So, every night for 3 months, we gathered at the hospital with family, friends and even strangers visiting their loved-ones to pray. One evening, while visiting alone by his bedside, I prayed that the Lord would perform a miracle that day as it was his mother's birthday. The Lord answered my prayer that instance. My nephew, for the first time in weeks, mumbled words to me. I was more convinced that the Lord was hearing our prayers and we just had to keep trusting.

He continued to progress. Everyone was amazed at his phenomenal progress, even to this day. He has full cognitive abilities, long and short-term memory intact, walking one and a half hours, six days per week, with good vision and a great sense of humour. God be praised!

This miracle has convinced many of the power of prayer and God's love. My prayer is that those who experienced this miracle will make a full commitment to develop a relationship with God.

How would you describe your Experience in our Church?

Previous to being assigned to Mt. Olive, I was at a church where I have friends and felt loved by the members. It was difficult leaving that environment, not knowing what to expect. However, from the very moment, I entered the doors at Mt. Olive; I felt the genuine warmth and love from all who greeted me. I felt at home and I look forward to every worship service and social event.


I pray that I have reciprocated that love and warmth to everyone I have made contact with here. I look forward to the time when we can meet again at church and more importantly for spending eternity together with our Lord and Saviour.

What are some of the programs you would like to see implemented in our church for newly baptized members?

What is mental health?



ental health is the state of your psychological and emotional well-being. It is a necessary resource for living a healthy life and a main factor in overall health. It does not mean the same thing as mental illness. However, poor mental health can lead to mental and physical illness.

Good mental health allows you to feel, think and act in ways that help you enjoy life and cope with its challenges.

This can be positively or negatively influenced by:

- Life experiences, such as:
 - o family situation
 - o the death of a loved one
 - o financial and employment status
- Relationships with others, such as your:
 - o friends
 - o family members
 - o co-workers
 - o schoolmates



- Work or school environment
- Physical health, such as problems caused by:
 - o long-term illness
 - o problematic substance use
- The type of community you live in
 - is it a supportive and trusting community or one where everyone keeps to themselves?

How can you take care of your mental health?

Take care of your mental health in the same way you would take care of your physical health. It takes practice, patience and support.



You can maintain or improve your mental health by following the advice below.

- Know and accept that life can be challenging.
- Know and accept your strengths and weaknesses.
- Set realistic goals for yourself.
- Accept yourself and others. This is the basis of self-esteem.
- Learn to recognize and understand that you and others have both positive and negative feelings.

- Create a sense of meaning in your life by learning and trying new activities, like starting a hobby.
- Create healthy, trusting relationships with people who accept and support you.

Building a supportive community is an important way to improve mental health. Making meaningful connections with your family, friends, peers, colleagues and other members of your community can help you feel:

- Like you belong
- Safe and secure
- Free to express your thoughts and feelings on issues that are important to you

You can help create a healthy and safe environment where you live, learn, work and play by:

- Knowing and accepting that everyone has difficulties in their lives
- Taking part in local events and getting to know your neighbours
- Finding ways to get involved and giving back to your community
- Supporting and including people of different ages and backgrounds in your community

How does being mentally healthy benefit you?

Being mentally healthy can:

- Increase coping skills
 - how we handle difficult experiences and stresses
- Improve self-esteem
 - o feeling confident in your worth and abilities
- Improve resiliency
 - your ability to successfully move on after a negative event and regain control of your life

Increasing coping skills, self-esteem and resiliency encourages people to:

- Create healthy relationships
- Positively interact with their community
- Talk openly about their mental health, including their needs and wants

Feeling confident and competent in these areas can improve emotional strength. In turn, this can help improve and maintain your level of mental health.

How has Christianity influenced your life?

hristianity has to do with practicing on a daily basis the way of life taught by Jesus Christ. Doing this gives me some focus in life. It also helps to give my life some meaning and perspective. Following Jesus has made me become aware that there is more to living than this life.



Nevertheless, I am quite aware that we are all in a spiritual warfare. Our common foe is vicious, and he aims to destroy. Therefore, when I find myself drifting away from the way of truth, I can call on the grace of Christ to rescue and strengthen me. It is still my experience that real living for time and beyond lies in what decision one makes regarding the Lord Jesus Christ.

You are one of the founding members of Mt. Olive church. What motivated the group to start a new church?

Praise God for the willingness, determination and commitment of the brethren who share the same vision for fulfilling the mission of Christ. As a result, we came together to establish what is now the Mt Olive Seventh-day Adventist Church. As I can recall, the conversation was often about having a "centre", a lighthouse in the Rexdale area, to bring the good news of the gospel of Christ to those live in that region.

Prior to 1990, there was no Church presence northwest of the city of Toronto. From the Perth Ave Church (now Toronto Perth) and Harvie Ave church (now Toronto West/T-West) westward, the fields were white and ready for the harvest. Church members engaged into small group meetings, Bible study groups and even in prophecy seminars. The desire was to invite people to develop a saving relationship with Jesus Christ. The congregation we have today dates back to those humble beginnings.

How did you become a Seventh-day Adventist?

I do not really know how I became a Seventh day Adventist. I (am) was not aware that there is a set criteria or standard that one has to achieve to be qualified as a Seventh day Adventist. However, over a period of time I have grown to accept the biblical teachings as true. This includes the teaching that gives the only hope to humanity; the second coming of Jesus Christ. This I believe strongly. The other biblical truth is the Seventh day Sabbath. And I am not referring to the nominal assembly of the brethren on Saturdays; though that is good, it provides only the beginning steps to a fuller understanding of the Sabbath of the Lord. When these fundamental teaching was settled in my mind, I guess it was then indeed, I was a Seventh day Adventist.

What is your most rewarding experience?

If the question is meant to ask of my most rewarding Christian experience, then by far, the one that stands out is to see individuals get excited as the word of God comes alive to them. It is as though a new pair of glasses has just been fitted; everything looks different. That is what happens when spiritual enlightenment comes to the heart. When one shares the good news of Jesus and sees another embrace it joyfully then the joy of the Lord is evidenced in the confidence and boldness that such a one experiences. Nothing is more fulfilling or satisfying!

It is also rewarding when God calls us to come and reason with Him or when He shows mercy to the undeserving. It gives me great joy to know that God has a 'word' for our every need.

What are some of the programs you would like to see implemented in our church for the newly baptized members?

Becoming a member of our church should be about associating with other like-minded persons in learning more about God and how to know him personally. The church environment should be perfumed with this thought! Whether you are a new member or an older one we should be motivated by the thought of growing in the grace of Christ.

I believe that every congregation should provide an environment to help the new believers and others grow. For example, have presentations on "how to study the scriptures". We can only become mature believers and assist others to also become mature believers when we correctly divide the word of truth. In addition to a format for learning, our preaching must be simple enough to make the word of God come

alive to the hearers. The new believer must always be exposed to the experience of sharing the gospel with others. There is no better way to enjoy or experience the joy of salvation.

How would you explain the second coming of Jesus Christ to a non-believer?

Things of great value are best kept very close to their owners. There they are protected and cared for constantly. They often bring joy and pleasure to their owners who have a strong bond with their possessions. That is why Jesus Christ will come back to this earth again! He has to claim His precious possession, the church.

The second coming of Jesus will fulfil the hope that we have been living with for so long. Though this was a gift to humanity, only those who accept it will have it fully realized. Not even death can prevent this joyful reunion!

Those who ignore or may stubbornly refuse to submit to the obligations of the truth, are not unaware of the return of Jesus Christ to this earth. However, in everything that we do there must be a balancing of the equation. What comes after the equal (=) sign is as important as what is before. The coming of Jesus will "balance" the equation.

What advice would you give to the young people in our church?

Remembering One of Our Founding Members

Elder Doris Chin October 30, 1930 – April 13, 2020

n 1990, Sister
Doris Chin, a
former member of
the Kingsview Village
Seventh-day
Adventist Church
along with other
vibrant members of
both Kingsview



Village and Perth Avenue (now Toronto Perth)
Seventh-day Adventist Churches started the Branch
Sabbath School at the North Albion Collegiate
Institute (NACI). The name later changed to the
Mount Olive Seventh-day Adventist Church and
relocated to its current location.

Sis Chin served in the Sabbath School Department for several years. Her impeccable service was admired by teachers, superintendents and secretaries. She meticulously conducted Sabbath School on a whole. Many times, she led out in Bible classes. We were often left in awe after listening to her captivating and inspiring sermons. In 2004, she was ordained as an elder. She demonstrated good leadership skills, and exemplified the characteristics of a good Christian, and teacher.

As a well-known entrepreneur, her generosity had no limits. On Sabbaths after Divine Service, Sister Chin had boxes of bread and other delicacies from her bakery to share with members and visitors. She gladly donated her baked products to various functions and programs in our church.

Her kindness extended beyond Mt. Olive church. Upon hearing of the passing of Sister Chin, 'Marlon' said, "Mrs. Chin was very kind. When I was attending York Memorial Institute, she had a restaurant across from the school and all the students could get something to eat there. It doesn't matter how much money they had."

Another past student in remembering Sister Chin said, "I remember one day I did not have enough money to pay for the student special, and she gave me lunch"

She faced many challenges in her life. With her profound faith in God and the support of her family

she was able to overcome these challenges. After she had gone through a traumatic experience, she openly testified to the Mt. Olive congregation about the power of prayer and God's protection. She mentioned that throughout her ordeal she did not feel any pain and she knew that God was always with her, because He had kept her.

In an interview with the Communications
Department she stated that, having gone through two
major trials in two consecutive years including the
death of her husband she could describe herself as
modern-day Job. When she was asked what advice
would she give to the church members, especially the
young people, her reply to them was not to
compromise when they are going through trials and
temptations but take their problem to God in prayer.
She further stated, "There is no problem that God
cannot solve."

Elder Chin passed away peacefully in her sleep at Sunnybrook Hospital three days after the sudden passing of her beloved daughter Dianne. She is predeceased by her husband Harald, son Errol, and daughter Dianne. She is survived by her children, Keith, Randolph, Franklin, Hope, Valda, Brent, Floyd and Carol, grandchildren, great grandchildren and great great grandchild.

Life on earth is not the end. John 14:1-4 states, "In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also. And whither I go ye know, and the way ye know." We are also assured by John the Revelator, of that blessed home after death in Revelation 21: 4, "And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."

Elder Chin had indeed fought a good fight and will be sadly missed by all. May her soul rest in peace.

Mount Olive Church Community Services During Covid-19

he COVID 19, a global pandemic has not only sent the world



in a state of virtual lockdown but tremendous fear and disbelief. This pandemic severely impacted all aspects of life globally, shutting down services essential to living routinely. Even the church food bank was closed for two weeks in compliance with government stipulation. Nevertheless, amidst the drastic changes, severe psychological disturbances, suffering and unprecedented fear, the committed and dedicated members of the Mount Olive Community Services Department never wavered on their commitment.

With the aid of ADRA, Daily Bread, Second Harvest and Maple Leaf Sport Entertainment (MLSE) the Community Services Department continues to fulfil its mandate of delivering food, clothing, services and other basic commodities that the department has received for the participants within the community and its environs during the pandemic. Youth Without Shelter, one of the retirement homes in Brampton and the Mount Olive Community Hub are recipients of MLSE donation of a variety of cooked meal which were delivered by Second Harvest.

To ensure the safety of everyone, good hygiene practices and preventative precautions are implemented which are of paramount



importance to the group. Masks, gloves and bottles of soap are placed at strategic locations at all times so that they could be accessible to everyone. Social distancing is also implemented and practiced. The department also ensures that the location for the food storage is properly sanitized.

On Wednesday mornings the team unloads the trucks containing a variety food supplies including meat, fresh fruits and vegetables from Second Harvest and Daily Bread food banks. The food is sorted and packed to make it more accessible to the participants. Sometimes they received vouchers to purchase milk and eggs. The participants have expressed their sincere gratitude for the food and services that they received. Prior to the operation of the food bank, the group paused for a moment of spiritual reflection. Prayer is offered either by a volunteer or a participant and they encouraged one another to hold fast until Jesus comes.

Pastor Frankie Lazarus, and the Community Services leader, Sister Cossetta Evans, along with other members respond in a commendable way to their commitment; delivering food boxes weekly to participants who are unable to visit the food bank. They also deliver food to people in Brampton, Maple and any location that calls with requests for food to be dropped off.

May God continue to bless and strengthen the members and volunteers as they continue to bring hope to His people.


he was 5 and has always loved every bit of it.


When I arrived home, there was a message on my answering machine. I tried unsuccessfully to listen to the message. However, it was not clear, so I deleted it.



Plantain Bread



Ingredients:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 very ripe plantain
- 3 tsp egg replacer powder +½ cup water
- ½ cup sugar
- ¼ cup almond milk
- ¼ cup coconut oil melted
- 1 tbsp apple cider vinegar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 ½ tsp baking powder
- ½ tsp baking soda
- ¼ tsp salt

Instructions:

- Preheat your oven to 350°F
- Grease and flour a 9×5 loaf pan and set it aside
- In a bowl, combine the all-purpose flour, wheat flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Set aside.
- In a separate bowl, smash the ripe plantain until it is pretty smooth, then add in the egg replacer and water mixture, sugar, almond milk, coconut oil, apple cider vinegar, and vanilla. Whisk until the wet mixture is combined.
- Create a well in the bowl with the flour mixture and pour in the liquid mixture and mix until it is just combined. Do not over mix!
- Pour the plantain bread/cake batter into the prepped loaf pan and bake in the preheated oven for 50- 55 minutes.
- Allow the plantain bread/cake to cool in the pan for 5 minutes, remove from the pan and cool for another 15 minutes, then serve.

It seems as if someone is playing a cruel juggling act with the days necessitating a conscientious effort to distinguish them. Regarding my orientation, thank God, I am still standing.

It is Sabbath morning and I am supposed to be in church - that is the building. On Wednesday evenings I am also supposed to do the same. My mind, however, has taken the circuitous route back home. Why? Oh, I am supposed to be Zooming or calling in to join the brethren in worship. The assembled have been pixelated. The atmosphere necessitates a reminder of the reason for the assembly as well as a call for reverence. The camera never lies so it indiscreetly captures and transmits images that are so near yet so far. The preferred alternative of dialing in is a well utilized blessing even though the challenge of working the mute/unmute button is often frustrating.




In terms of meeting format not much has changed but delivery creativity continues to be increasingly impressive. The services last a little

less than the in-person meetings and are designed to be fully inclusive and interactive. In response to the invitation, many visitors are tuning in and enjoying the worship experience. This is evidenced by repeat visits and positive feedback from friends and family who under normal circumstances would not have attended the physical building for worship. I praise God for this.

I praise Him for the blessing from the increase in knowledge that leads to these technological wall breakthroughs. I praise God for adaptability. I praise God who enables me to maintain my orientation in Him regardless of my circumstances. My priorities have changed for the better. My relationship with Him is stronger as my life is more centered around prayer, Bible and biblical studies, and personal outreach. His grace has not changed and so despite life's unimaginable twists and turns, I am still

- 1. Matthew. Suffered martyrdom in Ethiopia, killed by a sword wound.
- 2. Mark. Died in Alexandria, Egypt, after being dragged by Horses through the streets until he was dead.
- 3. Luke. Was hanged in Greece as a result of his tremendous Preaching to the lost.
- 4. John. Faced martyrdom when he was boiled in huge Basin of boiling oil during a wave of persecution In Rome. However, he was miraculously delivered from death.

John was then sentenced to the mines on the prison Island of Patmos. He wrote his prophetic Book of Revelation on Patmos. The apostle John was later freed and returned to serve As Bishop of Edessa in modern Turkey. He died as an old man, the only apostle to die peacefully

- 5. Peter. He was crucified upside down on an x shaped cross. According to church tradition it was because he told his tormentors that he felt unworthy to die in the same way that Jesus Christ had died.

12. Matthias. The apostle chosen to replace the traitor Judas Iscariot. He was stoned and then beheaded.
